CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

EDUCATION SESSIONS

This conference brings you educational opportunities that reflect current medical knowledge and practice. Attending this conference ensures that you will provide appropriate, evidenced-based patient care and follow procedures critical to smooth and efficient on-scene operations. There are over 100 sessions to choose from, divided over numerous tracks and all presented by experts in the field. Follow the track that is most important to you or select sessions where you would like to build additional skills.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDITS

Mental Health First Aid for Fire and EMS

Barbara Vaning, MHA; Bill Greenhalgh, NREMT, MHFA Instructor In 2017, 103 FIRE/EMS personnel died by suicide; over 93 died in the line of duty, approximately 85% of first responders have experienced symptoms related to mental health issues, and about 75% of rescue workers report mild symptoms of psychological trauma following a disaster. According to a national survey of first responders, nearly 40% of respondents said there would be negative repercussions for seeking mental health help at work. This session will teach Fire/EMS personnel how to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. The session will also teach the skills needed to reach out and provide initial support to someone who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem and help connect them to the appropriate care.

EMS Response to a Large-Scale Incident Including EMS Branch TTT Tabletop

NJ EMS Task Force

This program is intended to prepare EMS personnel to respond to and operate at Large Scale Incidents. When a patient refuses transport to the hospital, the EMS clinicians are the only medical professionals that the patient interacts with that day, putting EMS in a unique role to connect those patients to SUD resources.

"Five Minutes to Help" is a training developed by the Department of Health that aims to educate all first responders about effective communication with patients following treatment of a suspected opioid overdose and how to provide patients with local, regional, and national resources to reduce the number of repeat overdose patients.

Part 1 of this class is the traditional Five Minutes to Help content that teaches providers about addressing the stigma surrounding SUD, how to do basic motivational interviewing, and how to connect patients to resources. Part 2 of this class goes into more depth of these concepts and also teaches participants how to teach the Five Minutes to Help curriculum to other EMS providers. The Crashing Patient and Bundles of Care

Patients who are critically ill upon EMS arrival may only have minutes until cardiopulmonary collapse and death. Recognizing these "crashing" patients that are peri-arrest and providing immediate life saving intervention is crucial to preventing EMS witnessed cardiac arrests. Moving patients out to the ambulance is one of the most unrecognized risky interventions performed. Patients are generally poorly monitored and can suffer a cardiac arrest while being extricated to the ambulance. This danger also extends to patients successfully resuscitated, with ROSC on scene, as they are also at high risk of re-arrest during patient movement. With proper training and management, these cases of "dead on ambulance arrival" can be mitigated through the prompt intervention and stabilization by ALS and BLS crews.



Seizures account for between 5% and 8% of all EMS responses in the United States, and about 71% of those patients end up being transported to an ED. Rapid treatment is essential to the survival of the seizure patient, and even in those patients that do not succumb to their seizures, time is brain - in some instances, patients having absence seizures for instance, this cannot be stressed enough. In one study paramedics missed 50% of the children with active seizure activity. Identifying patients with status seizures is crucial to reducing death and disability. EEG is the golden standard to detect seizures, but it has not been used in the prehospital setting because traditional forms of EEG require over 30 minutes of time and a trained EEG technologist to apply the device. A new portable EEG device has the potential to not only improve the diagnosis of patients having seizures but could eventually be employed to identify patients with TBI and large vessel occlusion.

This presentation will cover best practices for engaging with people who are blind, including self-identifying as an EMS professional since the patient may not have the visual cues to recognize the person as EMS; appropriate techniques for guiding a blind person if necessary; and alerting the person when possible if the EMS professional is going to make physical contact. The presentation will also cover etiquette tips when the patient is accompanied by a guide dog as well as the legal rights and responsibilities of guide dog handlers in ambulances and health care settings.
